ARTIST OF THE MONTH: SANFORD (SANDY) LUNT

The artist of the month for March is Sanford Lunt. His is a unique story about painting, not on a house or walls, but putting a brush to canvas. He always wanted to try his luck but never had the time or opportunity until he moved to Oronoque. He, along with five of his friends, joined an art class in oils at the Baldwin Center in 1997. His first painting, a portrait in black and white, is being shown in this quarterly art exhibit for the wonderful Art Guild that has evolved from the Artist of the Month program.

He was among the organizers who started the Artist of the Month program in 2006 and a member of the inaugural committee that set up the exhibit and recruited artists to display works of art at NCB resulting in 39 consecutive months of new artists; a fine example of the talent that we have In the Village.

Sandy has displayed his art in several exhibits and had his paintings selected for a prestigious calendar published by Pomeraug Woods Senior Juried Art Show featuring Connecticut-based artists who are over the age of 82.

Formerly of Westport, Sandy has been an active resident of Oronoque Village for 28 years. He is a past president of the OV Tax District and was an alternate representative for District 6 for 11 years. 
Sandy also has been active in the Town of Stratford, serving as a member of the Board of Education Communi-

the question and in my mind went down the list of French terms for serving steak as far as I vaguely remembered them. One seemed clearer and therefore safer to use correctly than the rest, so I informed the waiter in what I thought was proper French that I would like a pan-fried steak.

For a split second his eyes seemed to widen and the corners of his mouth to broaden his professional smile. Then he bowed and said "Tres bien, mademoiselle." He left and returned with my steak a short while later. It was per-

fect, and I felt very pleased with myself.

Back at the office, a French colleague wanted to know how I had made out ordering a meal. "Did you get what you had asked for?" she asked.

"No problem," I answered. "But I decided to play it safe and ordered a simple 'bifteck au poil.""

"YOU ORDERED WHAT?" she gasped.

"The French version of a good old pan-fried steak. You know – un bifteck au poil. Why? What's wrong with it?"

"A frying pan is une poêle in French You should have ordered un bifteck a la poêle."

"Poêle / poil they sound the same to me. What's the difference?

"Quite a bit, I'm afraid" she informed me. "You see, un poil is a human body hair in our language."

"So what exactly does au poil mean?"

"It's an expression primarily used in soldiers' barracks and male locker rooms to exhort the men to take everything off and hit the showers," she said while trying hard not to laugh. It would

appear that you ordered a stark-naked steak."

Why couldn't that darned waiter have set me straight instead of letting me make a fool of myself," I fumed.

"My dear, you are in France now. No Frenchman would embarrass a lovely young lady by pointing out that she made a mistake. But you can be sure they had a good laugh about it in the kitchen after you left."

In all the years I lived in Paris I never ordered another pan-fried steak. I ate in many restaurants, but I never went back to that cozy little bistro.






