A MESSAGE FROM THE OV TAX DISTRICT

AN ACCESS CONTROL SYSTEM FOR ORONOQUE VILLAGE

One of the primary responsibilities of the Oronoque Village Tax District (OVTD) to oversee the security of our community. During this fiscal year, started July 1, OVTD will phase-in a significant enhancement to our security in the form of an Access Control System (keyless entry). Our goal is to not only optimize our safety and

security but, through this system, produce business analytics so we can even better manage our resources.

Discussions of implementing such a system in OV started nearly 15 years ago. At that time, the costs were significant, but much has changed since then. As with most technologies, costs go down over time. That is the case now with Access Control Systems. It is estimated that the return on our investment will be only about 18-24 months. For these reasons, OVTD allocated this purchase into our 2022-

23 budget. But, it is a small portion of the budget, approximately 2 percent.

It's probable that many of you are already familiar with such a system. This is not new technology. Keyless entry for many businesses began in the 1980s and by the following decade became the norm. Residential communities soon followed, including HOAs. Heritage Village implemented its system this past January.

Our Executive Director and Director of Maintenance Operations did considerable research on various access control security systems and providers. They recommended Kastle Systems. Their recommendation of Kastle was based on the scope of its services, flexibility in working with our existing security infrastructure, experience, price point and support staff. The OV Security Committee -- plus the OVTD president, vice president and treasurer -- also met with Kastle and confirmed our management's recommendation of this vendor.

To familiarize our residents with these changes, Kastle will visit OV and conduct "Town Hall-style" meetings on this new system. We want everyone to feel comfortable with the technology and demonstrate its advantages to our community. Look for the announcements for these vendor meetings.

The main features of the Access Control system are:

- 1. Cloud-based system that eases the storage and retrieval of information.
- 2. System would cover the entrances to NCB, SCB, the fitness center and both pools.
- 3. Keyless entry would be achieved by a mobile device, card or fob.
- 4. Purchase price includes an upgrade of all existing security cameras.
- 5. System is expandable and flexible for future considerations.

The advantages of an Access Control System for OV:

- 1. Less reliance on "human" monitoring of our facilities and amenities
 - 2. Manage after-hours resident visits to buildings.
- 3. Availability of reliable facilities usage data to potentially reduce utility costs.
- 4. The system has the ability for residents checking the capacity of the amenities (i.e. pools and fitness center) before their visits.
- 5. Availability of reliable data on who is entering and using our facilities. We will be able to determine, at any time, who's in our facilities.
- 6. We will know that anyone accessing facilities has legitimate credentials. In the words of our Stratford Police liaison, Captain Brian Budd: "Any measures that restrict

unauthorized access to your community is always a positive decision."

7. New residents will need to visit the Business Office to get access, and can get orientation at the same time.

Let me take a few of these points and expand on them:

System would cover the entrances to NCB, SCB the Fitness Center and both pools

OVTD will partner with the OVCA House Committee and Pool Committee in determining the hours requiring keyless entry into these facilities. The goal is finding the right balance of guaranteeing the best security without inconveniencing our residents. In all probability, the fitness center in the South Clubhouse will be the likely first rollout of this system.

Keyless entry would be achieved by a mobile device, card or fob

Mobile devices are becoming the standard, and most cost-efficient means of using keyless entry. If you have a smartphone, you will be able to use it in lieu of a card or fob. However, there will also be card and fob options available. The process of utilizing your smartphone for keyless entry, along with obtaining a card or fob, will be administered by our Business Office with the guidance of our Ex-

ecutive Director. Details will follow, but obtaining a method of keyless entry would be a requirement of all residents, both new and existing.

Availability of reliable facilities usage data to potentially reduce utility costs.

This system will be able to provide us data on the ebb and flow of resident occupancy during all hours. Given those business analytics, we'd be able to adjust our heating and air conditioning to coincide with the times of peak and off-peak occupancy in our buildings. This can lead to saving on utility costs.

New residents will need to visit the Business Office to get access and can get orientation at the same time.

New residents will need to get their means of access to use our facilities. This would require a visit to our Business Office. At that time they can schedule a meeting with our Executive Director and get their new resident orientation, which will include the Welcome Packet.

OVTD is committed to making our community safe while, at the same time, not restricting the enjoyment and ease of using our facilities. We're also committed to communicating these changes as we phase-in the system and make it as simple as possible to use.

TOWN OF STRATFORD TAX PAYMENT REMINDER

First installments of tax bills and sewer usage bills were due July 1. The last day to pay without interest is Aug. 1. Contactless payments are strongly encouraged.

- Online payment options are available at www. stratfordct.gov
- Mail your payment to: Tax Collector, Town of Stratford, PO Box 9722, Stratford, CT 06615-9211.
- Dropbox for those paying by check only. Include a copy of each tax bill being paid and place in a sealed

envelope. Dropbox is located in the Town Hall, 2725 Main St., outside of the Tax Collector's Office

• In-person payments may be made Monday through Friday between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. at the Tax Collector's Office, located at 2725 Main St.

The Tax Collector's Office will be open Saturday, July 30, from 9 a.m. to noon to accept payments. Additionally, payments may be made at People's United Bank locations as long as you do not owe back taxes and have the original copy of your tax bill.

MOSQUITO CONTROL PRACTICES IN STRATFORD

t's that time of year again where the Stratford Health Department looks at taking measures to prevent illnesses such as West Nile virus (WNV) carried by mosquitoes. Teaming up with the Town's Public Works Department, the focus is to treat the town's 5,283 catch basins with a nontoxic larvicide.

"Stratford will be treating all of our catch basins starting later in July, weather permitting, and will continue through the summer season, as needed and as funding permits," said Kelly Kerrigan, the Town's environmental conservation superintendent. She advises that you can do your part by reducing standing water on your property to limit areas where mosquitoes can breed. Residents can also purchase larvicide brickettes or "dunks" at local hardware stores or places like Home Depot to treat areas on their property where water may pool.

Stratford's Health Director Andrea Boissevain said, "We track mosquito surveillance data from the state agricultural stations located here in Town at Beacon Point and Beaver Dam Road and, so far, all of the mosquitoes have been negative for West Nile Virus and Eastern Equine Encephalitis."

Boissevain and Kerrigan outlined some tips on how to avoid mosquito bites and decrease mosquito activity around your home:

REMOVE STANDING WATER

Rid your property of extra standing water. Artificial containers such as barrels and birdbaths are frequently used by mosquitoes for laying eggs.

Cleaning clogged gutters.

Drilling holes in bottom of recycling containers.

Fixing holes in your screens.

WEAR PROTECTIVE CLOTHING

Wear shoes, socks, long pants, and a long-sleeved shirt when outdoors for long periods of time, or when mosquitoes are most active. Clothing should be light-colored and made of tightly woven materials that keep mosquitoes away from the skin.

Minimize time spent outdoors around dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active.

Be sure door and windows screens are tight fitting and in good repair.

Use mosquito netting when sleeping outdoors or in an unscreened structure and to protect small babies when outdoors.

USE INSECT REPELLENT

Considering using mosquito repellent, as directed, when outdoors.

Repellents made with 20-30 percent of the active ingredient DEET are very effective when used properly; however, do not use on children under 2 years of age.

The State started its mosquitoes collecting and testing program June 1. Tests are for the presence of WNV and Eastern Equine Encephalitis through October. For more information on mosquito control, visit the Stratford Health Department's website at www.stratfordct.gov/health and follow on Twitter @HealthStratford and Instagram for tips and info.

The Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station also has information for the public on mosquito surveillance control and mosquito-borne diseases. The most up-to-date mosquito information across Connecticut can be accessed at http://www.ct.gov/mosquito.

WHEN SHOULD YOU CALL THE OV SECURITY NUMBER?

Oronoque Village has a security phone number (203-377-5502) that is manned by a 24-hour-a-day answering service. This number is meant for residents who experience maintenance-related emergencies, such as a water main break, sewage backup or roof leak.


The security phone number should never be called when you are in need of a first-responder.



FACEBOOK POSTING SUGGESTIONS

The way your engage with your friends, family and contacts on Facebook could have a serious impact on your relationships online and off. Consider following these suggested guidelines to ensure your social media conduct is polite, meaningful and reflects basic human decency.

- 1. Always show respect, especially when discussing or posting personal views. "Don't question someone's intelligence or integrity," says Daniel Post Senning, author of "Manners in a Digital World: Living Well Online." He adds, "Make your argument about the situation or issue, not the person you're talking to."
- 2. Quit complaining. Grumbling about your life is the second most annoying Facebook offense for users, according to Real Simple Magazine. You should never complain about work or colleagues online. You never know you may see it, even with the strictest privacy settings in order. And don't complain about your day-to-day in general. "Nobody likes the complainer," Anna Post, author of Emily Post's Etiquette, told Forbes Magazine.
- 3. Avoid the "humblebrag." There's nothing worse than friends posting about their newest shopping purchase, vacation or achievement and trying to seem modest about it. You may want your friends to know you're blessed and truly appreciate all that you have, but no one likes a braggart.
- 4. Always reveal big news to friends and family first. Engagements, pregnancies, new jobs, births, divorces, deaths and any other major life event or news should be shared in-person or over the phone before it's shared publicly on-

line. It's both impersonal and insensitive to skip this step and may offend loved ones.

- 5. Find and evaluate the original source before you share. You may think that popular story is worth a share, but it could be insensitive or deliberately inaccurate. Avoid spreading fake news (defined as deliberate misinformation or hoaxes), scams or potentially offensive stories by doing a little research first.
- 6. Never post photos of someone else's children. Privacy is very important to some parents and families, which is why you should always ask for permission before posting. "People have digital boundaries for their families and it's important to respect them," etiquette guru Lizzie Post told Today.com.
- 7. Never share unflattering photos. Let's remember the golden rule: treat others as you would like to be treated. You wouldn't like it if someone shared an embarrassing or unattractive image of you, right?
- 8. Never "like" bad news. Hitting the "like" button just doesn't make sense when someone announces the death of a loved one, a divorce, health problems or any sort of sad or somber post. Use the proper reaction button or, even better, leave a thoughtful comment on the post.
- 9. Acknowledge tragedies with a simple, empathic message. If you want to share your sympathies after terrorist attack, weather disaster or death, go for it, but keep in mind this is not the time to inject your political views, judgements or complaints.






