want to wish the newly elected OVCA officers and district representatives all the best in their upcoming terms. The Tax District will continue to work with OVCA for the benefit of the Village.

I hope residents are experiencing a healthy autumn season. Due to some recent cases of Covid in the Village, we were hoping to offer a Zoom dial-in for the resi-

dents to hear the audio portion of our meeting in their homes, but we need to purchase additional equipmentthat will allow the audio to be more understandable.

As always, I want to thank Fred Rodriguez and Mark Rhatigan for their guidance and professionalism in working with the Tax District directors. In addition, we thank their entire staffs for their ongoing high standard of work.

After multiple discussions with the Stratford Refuse Director and Chris Tymniak, chief of staff, Mark Rhatigan was successful in the Town agreeing to not renew with Oak Ridge Waste and Recycling. Oronoque is now being serviced by County Disposal for both trash and recycling, which has been servicing our recycling collection since 2019. Their performance has been reliable and has shown greater care to the needs of Oronoque Village. Mark met with the owners of County Disposal, who assured him that they will do everything possible to improve trash collection.

The Roads Committee, chaired by Jonathan Towle, gave a full report on the accelerated road replacement work that started on Oct. 24.

Falcon Engineering identified the roads to be paved. Four roads in the North Village, eight roads in the South

Village and two cul-de-sacs in the South Village will be included in Phase 1.

When the fall paving program is completed, the Roads Committee will begin to plan the paving program for the fall of 2023.

No further water main or sewer breaks have occurred since our last Tax District meeting in July. As you know from the new 2022-2023 budget, we substantially increased the budget line item for repairing these breaks since the prior year the Village had numerous issues.

The Access Control System is on target. Based on the House Committee's recommendations, we are focusing on the South Clubhouse first. Our employees are now working on the wiring and cabling at SCB as a precursor to installation. In addition, we have been in close contact with our vendor, Kastle, on the implementation logistics. As initially planned, the first live installation will be the Fitness Center and it will be completed no later than Dec. 15. This will eliminate the metal key method for off-hour entry. After installation, an off-hour entry will require a smartphone, card or fob. The Business Office will notify all residents on how to activate their devices for keyless entry or how to obtain a card or fob for keyless entry.

Implementing the Access Control System will make our buildings even safer. In addition to wiring for the keyless entry, the enhanced wiring will have smoke detection, and any forced entries will trigger a combination of door closings (for fire) and automated notices to the fire and police departments.

The Tree Committee presented a detailed report this month since it is our annual planting season for various shrubs and ornamental trees throughout the Village. The areas identified for installation are replacements for a pre-existing tree that was in need of removal per resident requests. There were approximately 25 trees and 24 shrubs purchased and installed. In addition to the new plantings, the Maintenance Department has procured a boom-lift rental In October. This will save the Tax District funds by reducing the need for an outside pruning contractor. The boom allowed us to complete the backlog of tree pruning work orders and remove lower hanging limbs over roads scheduled for replacement.

Tom Aubin, TD vice president, has agreed to serve as chairperson on the Alternate Energy Committee to investigate potential solutions for energy. He organized a conference call on Oct. 25 with the United Illuminating Company (UI). Fred Rodriguez, Mark Rhatigan and I attended this meeting. The UI officers that led the discussion with us were Marissa Westbrook, manager program and product development, and Erik Robie, director of customer programs and products, plus two additional UI representatives.

This initial meeting was to understand a path forward to study potential solutions for energy as well as develope a request for proposal. We will investigate solar potential and a possible microgrid project. All alternate energy solutions will be considered. The Tax District feels it is in the best interests of the community to be proactive in this technology for the Village. There is a plan to identify solar developers who we might work with to study this potential.

Under new business, Bill Tanski made the following motion: "I move that the Proposed Ordinance, 2022.10 – Nominations for Board of Directors, be adopted by the Board to supersede all previous ordinances related to recommending qualified candidates to the voters for the election of Directors and Officers to the OVTD Board. This process is to be carried out by an appointed Ad Hoc Nominating committee rather than by Nominators elected in each of the eleven OVCA Districts." Tom Aubin seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

The Tax District directors will continue to plan carefully to protect your tax dollars with any recommended projects.

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ARTIST OF THE MONTH: WOLFGANG NOVOTNY



The Artist of the Month for November is Wolfgang Novotny. His vibrant watercolors, acrylic and oil paintings are on view in a rotating exhibit at NCB.

Born in Vienna, Austria, Wolfgang emigrated to New York City in 1962 with his mother. Although he only recently began to show his work publicly, his fascination --

and skill -- in painting dates back to his childhood.

"My mother's side of the family is incredibly talented and creative," he explains. "My maternal grandfather, Hugo Henschl, was an acclaimed professional artist and university teacher. He was renowned for his copper-plate etchings and oil paintings of Austrian landscapes and people. His work inspired me to paint at an early age.

"Although, I never met my grandfather, I grew up surrounded by his work and developed a great appreciation for his skills," he adds. "My admiration of his artwork has only grown with time. My dreams is to, one day, curate an exhibit that features my grandfather's paintings."

Wolfgang's mother also was a creative force. "She was a high-fashion hat designer," he notes. "Her creations were Hollywood-style, intricate with veils and pins. She had a hat design featured on the cover of Vogue magazine."

Despite his creative background, Wolfgang took a pragmatic approach to his college studies. "I didn't want to be pigeon-holed with an art degree" he says. "I attended Hunter College in New York to earn a psychology degree. "My 'art major' friends urged me to abandon my psychology studies and pursue an art degree," he continues. "I did not heed their advice, but there was a period where — as



part of a psychology class assignment — I chose to paint imagery inspired by my dreams. This made for a powerful connection!"

After graduating from Hunter, he earned a master's degree in education from Columbia University, specializing in counseling psychology and rehabilitation. After happily working in the field for about five years, Wolfgang re-entered academia to obtain an M.B.A. degree in finance from NYU. "I was able to work for various international banks, utilizing my strong bilingual skills," he says. In subsequent years, he earned the Chartered Financial Analyst (CFA) designation and continued his focus on financial risk management.

Over the years, he held analytical positions with Moody's Investors Service and international financial institutions. However, from time to time, the canvas would call to him. "I would paint in spurts," he says. "I work in a variety of media, but I truly enjoy the sensuous colors and smoothness of painting in oils." However, during the pandemic shutdown, Wolfgang renewed his interest in working with watercolors.

Now retired, Wolfgang enjoys taking painting classes and pursuing his artistic passions. Also, he and his wife, Katie, enjoy the opportunities that life at Oronoque Village provides. "We moved here six years ago," he reports. "As soon as we saw the community, we fell in love with it. The community is well-maintained and there is much to do. We enjoy the views, pools, the facilities and the amenities. This is a very friendly and well-maintained community."

As a member of the OV Arts Guild, in 2019 he held a sixweek exhibition as part of a two-person featured artist show at Galerie OV



OCTOBER 12 PLETMAN CONCERT: 'HAUNTING AND COLORFUL'

"Hauntingly beautiful music and beautiful young women. A wonderful afternoon that went by too fast."

"I really enjoyed the concert yesterday. You would think they'd been performing for years from the sound of their beautiful harmonization."

These were just two of the comments received from members of the audience at Pletman Concert's program of music from the Balkans, Eastern Mediterranean, Middle East and Crimea, performed in colorful costumes by the Yale Slavic Chorus.

Members of the chorus took turns in introducing each song with a brief translation of the old folk songs about love, men working in the fields, women at the spinning wheel and life in the village. A small percussion instrument, called a "doumbek," accompanied two songs from Bulgaria — one about a boy and a girl meeting in a field and another one about women in the village gossiping about an old man who decides he wants to go to the dance, so he dresses up as a young man, but all the young girls run away.

"The Slavs," as the chorus is popularly called, start all their performances with "Shto me e milo," a song from Macedonia: "How happy I am to live in the village of Struga, where I have



a little shop, and I can sit in the window and watch the women go down to the well, with their many-colored pitchers, to laugh and talk with their friends."

They end all performances with "Prevrukhna Ptichka," a wedding song from Thrace/Bulgaria that is also their alumni song: "The bird flies over the courtyard, over the white rose, lightly fluttering, quietly calling: "I am coming, young bride, to bring you great joy. The fields are flat and full of grain, the black-headed ewes have all given birth to twins, the bees have formed new hives and all the little children are lively and healthy."

It was a charming ending that came all too soon.

MAINTENANCE MATTERS

FIREPLACE SAFETY

Your fireplace is primarily decorative and should not be used for heat or cooking. Used conscientiously, your fireplace will provide wonderful ambience on a cold winter's day.

When using your fireplace, we urge you to keep in mind the following safety tips:

Wood-Burning Fireplaces

Always be sure that the damper is open before you start your fire, while it is burning and until all embers are extinguished.

Never leave your unit while a fire is burning. Keep a fully charged fire extinguisher nearby.

Be sure to have a screen or glass doors to prevent sparks from flying into the room. Be sure nothing flammable is near the fireplace.

Never burn scraps of wood or lumber, charcoal, magazines, garbage or plastics.

Make small fires: use only one artificial log or one or two wood logs. Build your fire toward the back of the firebox.

Make sure that the fire is out -- completely extinguished and cool -- and that ashes and residue are cool to the touch before attempting to clean out the fireplace.

Use metal containers to hold anything you remove from the fireplace; bring that container outside, at least three feet from any building or bush, to store it. Never place fireplace residue in bags or boxes or nonmetallic containers and never place removed material on a deck or porch or inside a garage or unit while awaiting final disposal.

If you burn wood once per week, have your fireplace professionally cleaned every other year.

If you burn wood more than once per week, the fireplace should be professionally cleaned once each year.

Gas Fireplaces and Heaters

Direct vent gas fireplaces and heaters must be from an

approved manufacturer, must meet Oronoque Village's and other codes, and must be installed by a licensed contractor.

Through-the-wall gas fireplaces and heaters must be

approved by the Architectural Committee and must meet

Oronoque Village's codes, and must be installed by a licensed contractor. Through-the-roof venting is not allowed.

Provide adequate protection and/or alarms from oxygen depletion and carbon-monoxide poisoning. Purchase a unit that will disconnect the gas flow when the pilot light is not lit. Fireplace shut-offs must be easily accessible from the unit.

Important: Never leave a fire burning when you are not at home.

HOLIDAY DECORATING TIPS

Seasonal decorations -- including lights, trees and wreaths -- can help put your household in the holiday spirit. However, when not used properly, decorations (particularly lights) can create safety hazards or cause fires.

Keep your home safe during the holidays by following these best practices to ensure your holiday lights and decorations are installed correctly:

• Double check lights for frayed wires or cracks, and be sure there is a bulb in each socket. Discard and replace damaged strands.

• Lights should be approved by Underwriters Laboratory. "UL" will be clearly displayed on the tag, signifying the product has been inspected for potential safety hazards. Red UL marks indicate the lights are safe for indoor/outdoor use, and green UL marks indicate the lights are only safe for indoor use.

•Do not hammer tacks or nails into the electrical cord when hanging lights. Instead, use clips to safely attach lights to the house.

 Use heavy-duty extension cords, and only use cords outdoors if they are designated for outdoor use. Avoid overloading extension cords by using no more than three sets of standard lights per cord.

• Use a timer or turn off lights before going to bed, or if you will be away from home.

•For special ornaments that plug into a bulb receptacle, use no more than two per strand or check the manufacturer's directions.

• Indoor lights should not touch drapes, furniture or carpeting. Keep lit candles away from flammable items, too.

• Prevent tripping by placing cords and decorations in lowtraffic areas where they won't be walked on. Avoid twisting,



kinking or crushing cords.

Following, are a few safety tips provided by the Stratford Fire Department:

• Smoke alarms should be placed on each level of a unit. Batteries should be changed twice yearly; it is advised to change the batteries at the same times that you change the clocks.

• Carbon-monoxide detection should be located near the sleeping areas.

• Christmas trees, if natural, should have a fresh cut at the base and maintained by being submerged in fresh water. Fresh cut trees can drink up to a gallon of water a day.

Never use real candles on or near a Christmas tree.

• If there is a need to use portable-type heaters, they should be placed on a level and nonflammable surface and kept away from any loose hanging materials, especially bedding and drapes.

• Never use cooking appliances, such as the kitchen stove, for the purpose of heating an occupied space.

By taking the proper precautions both inside and outside of your home, you can prevent hazards and focus on friends and family during the holidays.

Don't forget to periodically check lights and decorations throughout the season to ensure they continue to operate safely.

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


