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A MESSAGE FROM THE OVTD PRESIDENT

Good evening:

First and foremost, you, the residents, have spoken loudly with the record turnout for an OV Tax District election and the confidence that you have entrusted in

me to lead an incredibly talented and energetic team in the interest of our beloved Village. Thank you for joining us as we begin our journey together. It is my privilege to serve as your President of the OVTD and I sincerely appreciate your enthusiasm to reach out to me as we lay the groundwork of this organization in our community.

During the campaign, I promised to create a 100-day plan that includes assessing current committees and refining, as necessary. This will include a priority of short- and long-term road plan funding and execution, to be discussed shortly. Allow me to share with you the status of other components of this plan ... that which has already been achieved and that which remains to be accomplished.

On July 7, the new board attended an orientation meeting with Executive Director Mark Rhatigan and our legal counsel. Adam Cohen. At that time, we had a very informative review of the Tax District Charter, establishing agendas, minutes and the cans and cannots, the dos and don'ts of how we can best move forward. I would also like to thank our amazing office staff that has guided us in making this transition an educational and smooth process!

Residents Joining Committees: While campaigning, I often remarked on how much valuable experience was available from the residents in our community. In the July 3 Villager, there was a request for residents who might have an interest and background to reach out and join us. As of today, we have eight OV residents who have expressed an interest in possibly joining us on the five different committees. The agenda tonight includes motions to approve the Committee Chairs.

Coordination Between Executive Director, Maintenance and OVTD: We are planning dates for our regular monthly meetings with the Executive Director Mark Rhatigan and the Maintenance Director Ryan Hankey to establish clarity as well as agreeing to our proposed plan, setting the priorities as we commence execution. This will be invaluable as

we face another phase of the Road Repaving Project this year.

Strategic Plan: It can only benefit this Village to have more cooperation between the two governing bodies: OVTD and OVCA. I am pleased to say that both boards have already been working on the Oronoque Village Strategic Plan.

There have been three meetings and a presentation at the July 11 Town Hall. Twenty-five volunteers have stepped up to serve on committees and round out this plan. So, if you haven't already, please consider volunteering and leveraging your time, talent, and treasure to benefit our Village.

Meetings: OVCA, OVTD and our Executive Director will host a long-overdue New Resident business meeting on Thursday, Aug. 17, at 5 p.m. Then, in October, there will be a combined Treasurers Town Hall meeting and residents will be briefed on the results of the OV's audit from Glenn J. Nanavaty from Nanavaty, Davenport, Studley & White LLP Certified Public Accountants. They will review for us the year-end financials, line by line (if necessary), and answer questions.

Besides the four quarterly meetings and the annual meeting in May, there will be one or perhaps two Town Hall Meetings for more of a Q&A type presentation. The first one is tentatively scheduled for Sept. 7.

Additionally, OVTD minutes have always been posted on Oronoquevillage.com, but now I would like to include the committee reports with the minutes on the website.

Election Process: We will be taking a pragmatic view and assessing the overall election process in the near term. However, there is a major concern of mine that I have regarding absentee ballots and action has already been initiated. Every resident in the Village should have the opportunity to vote. Tom Fuchs and I have been working on getting support from our elected leaders to affect a change to our Charter that will allow absentee ballots. Letters were sent on June 28 o Senator Kevin Kelly and State Rep. Ben McGorty for their help and support in bringing this change in front of the State Government. Conversations were also had with representatives of the American Disability Act and Office of the Aging regarding voting rights. Our first meeting with Senator Kelly is scheduled for the first week in August.

Every great journey begins with a single step, often a small step. In our case we have already taken this first step. We will continue to take many more steps. Stay tuned.

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A LETTER FROM THE OV INSURANCE BROKER

To Oronoque Village Unit Owners:

I am the insurance broker for Oronoque Village Condominium Association and have worked with your Insurance Committee for the past four years to oversee the insurance program for OV.

My 40 years of insurance experience in the condominium industry has afforded me the experience to deal with the challenges and uniqueness that Oronoque Village offers. I have partnered with Steve Monteiro in our organization, who specializes in personal lines and a is

great resource.

We have been requested to briefly highlight some concerns unit owners have regarding what qualifies as enough coverage to meet the requirements of the Association's master policy. Although, we always recommend that you speak with a licensed insurance professional concerning your specific insurance needs, here are a few things to consider.

1.) The Oronoque Village Condominium Master Policy (OCMP), which is subject to a \$10,000 deductible, covers all structures owed by the Association and all common areas such as walkways and roadways. As part of the complex, Oronoque Village is responsible for the tennis courts, swimming pools, gyms, clubhouses, etc. It also covers the condominium units including inside walls and floors and any permanent improvements to the unit by the existing or prior unit owner.

2.) OV is not responsible for your personal property nor does OCMP's insurance coverage extend to your personal property, which is defined as anything you own that can be taken with you if you should move. We recommend condominium owners buy a HO-6 (condominium owners policy) to protect their personal property (Coverage C) even if not mandated by the By-Laws. For those unit owners who already have a HO-6, take an inventory of your belongings

and compare that to your existing coverage to determine if your coverage has kept up with todays' prices. Remember that certain property -- such as furs, jewelry, fine arts, etc. -- are limited in an unmodified policy so pay close attention to those items.

3.) Unit owners' HO-6 policies should carry, at the very minimum, \$10,000 in dwelling coverage (Coverage A) to cover the master policy's deductible if a claim should occur inside their unit. Now, this may or may not be enough to cover your actual loss, so speak to your insurance representative to determine the right amount of coverage.

4.) Injuries to a third-party occurring inside a unit is the responsibility of the unit owner. So, our recommendation is for all unit owners to carry a minimum of \$300,000 in liability. We also recommend purchasing an umbrella policy for additional liability limits. Limits are available in increments of \$1 million and higher. The amount of coverage will depend upon your propensity for risk.

5.) Finally, unit owners can purchase loss assessment coverage. It provides protection to unit owners when the building or common areas have been involved in a claim and the loss exceeds the amount covered on the condo's insurance policy. It covers the remaining out-of-pocket expenses — due to a qualifying peril. The value of the loss is assessed and may be divided among all individual unit owners.

a.) Here's a hypothetical example: The roof of the condo building is damaged during a storm. The master policy covers up to \$1 million for damage to the building but the cost to repair the building was actually \$1.5 million. That extra \$500,000 is assessed to all the unit owners -- let's say there are 100 units in the building, each condo owner would be assessed \$5,000 for the additional cost to repair damages.



SCAM ALERTS FROM AARP

Scammers are like viruses: They continually evolve in response to the latest news and trends, using them for new ways to separate us from our cash. These criminals "are so adaptable, they're going to just follow the headlines," says Amy Nofziger, director of fraud victim support for AARP.

As she and other anti-fraud experts note, scammers have proved ingenious when it comes to updating traditional criminal operations such as the romance scam or the Ponzi scheme with new twists to make them more convincing and effective. And like the rest of society, scammers are increasingly going online.

"Most con artists have taken a digital-first approach to scamming," says Josh Planos, vice president of communications and public relations for the Better Business Bureau (BBB). He notes that the vast majority of today's scams originate through a digital on-ramp, such as social media or email.

Here are a few emerging scams that anti-fraud experts are tracking in 2023, along with tips on how to thwart the crooks.

Cryptocurrency-romance scam: Crooks combine crypto scams with old-fashioned romance scams, posing as Internet love interests so they can cajole their targets into downloading an app and investing in fake crypto accounts.

"They claim that they're even putting some of their own money into your fund," explains former Federal Trade Commission official Steve Baker, who publishes the Baker Fraud Report. While the app displays data that seems to show your wealth growing, criminals are just taking your money.

How to stay safe: Carefully scrutinize any investment opportunity, even if you think you're a sophisticated investor. "People think it's not going to happen to them, but it is happening to many, which is why you have to keep your guard up," Nofziger says.

Payday loan scam: Criminals exploit the inflation squeezing workers by offering fake payday loans that they claim will help people settle their bills, according to Nofziger. Loan applicants are told they'll need to prepay a fee. The money goes into the crooks' pockets, and the applicant gets nothing.

How to stay safe: Be wary of anyone who asks you to pay any sort of loan fee with a gift card or some other non-traceable form of payment.

One-time password (OTP) bot scam: Credit reporting company Experian warns that scammers utilize bots — automated programs — to deceive people into sharing the two-factor authentication codes sent to them via text or email from financial institutions (or from companies such as Amazon). The bot will make a robocall or send a text that appears to come from a bank, asking you to authorize a charge, then it asks you to enter the authentication code you've just been sent if the transaction isn't yours. It's actually the bot that's trying to log into your bank account, and it wants the code that the bank sent to you as a precaution, so it can get in.

How to stay safe: Never share authentication codes, or provide other information, in response to an unsolicited phone call or text.
