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

An open Strategic Planning Workshop for volunteers will be scheduled during the month of September 2023 to discuss next steps, including teams, members, team facilitators and deliverables.

Feel Good News, residents stepping up to enhance our Village:

Guys and Dolls (formerly the Men's Club): Shout out to Nick Harding, his leadership and his team to take on the challenge of reinvigorating what was formerly the Men's Club by hitting a reset button and introducing the Guys and Dolls Club to the Village. The buzz throughout the Village has been amazing and witnessed by the July 30 picnic turnout of over 160 residents.

Shuffleboard Request and Proposal: I was approached by residents Bill Alletzhauser and Paul Maglione to discuss the possibility of bringing shuffleboard to the Village. Not everyone here is able to play pickleball or tennis but, shuffleboard is an opportunity to engage in an outdoor activity. All good things for senior citizens.

A meeting to explore this idea was conducted earlier this month with Mark and Ryan. Bill Alletzhauser is currently discussing grant opportunities with The town seeking contractors' estimates.

Other examples in the Village are the Good Times Club led, by Mary Ann Weaver, and Neighbor to Neighbor, organized Bahin Samimy.

Standing Committee Updates:

House Committee: Debbie Grosso, after six years of dedicated service and contributions, has decided to step down from the committee. I am pleased to announce that Linda Eastwood has agreed to become a member of the House Committee.

On behalf of the Village, we thank Debbie for her service and welcome Linda and look forward to her contributions to the committee.

Racquet Sports Facility (RSF): Chairperson Nancy Blagys informed me earlier this summer that she will be stepping down as chair.

First, I would like to thank Nancy for her leadership for years of service as chairperson, particularly over the past year working on the expansion of the pickleball courts.

I am pleased to announce that Carolyn Charnin has agreed to become the next RSF Chairperson. Carolyn has been a RSF member, and we are very fortunate to have her experience and outstanding leadership qualities in her new role.

Tax Appeal: Murtha Cullina has prepared a summons and complaint that were delivered to the Town of Stratford in August. We are currently awaiting a response from the Town.

Declaration: The review of the Declaration has been completed by the By-Laws Committee and reviewed by the Executive staff and legal counsel. It was reviewed by the OVCA Board on Aug. 9, 2023, at a special Board meeting.

The recommendation includes revisions around the organization of information in the Declaration, its clarity, definition of the entity "unit owner" and the introduction of a community contribution fee to be paid by the transferee

NOTICE OF MEETING OF UNIT OWNERS, SEPT. 6, AT 6:00 P.M. AT NCB

The purpose of the meeting is to present the OVCA Board-approved recommendation for the proposed changes to the Declaration and give unit owners an opportunity to ask questions. Proposed changes to the Declaration include the implementation of a Community Contribution Fee to be assessed at the time of a unit sale and paid by the buyer.

Information packets will be distributed in advance of the session.

(buyer). The board will vote on a motion tonight to determine if these proposed revisions will be submitted to the unit owners for their consideration.

Declaration changes require the approval of two-thirds (66.67 percent) of unit owners, this equates to the approval of 619 unit owners.

Roof Reserve: Becht Engineering BT, Inc. has been contracted to perform the roof reserve assessment commencing this month. Results are anticipated in late September and will be compared to funds in our roof reserve and next steps will be determined.

Insperity PEO (Professional Employer Organization): The transition has been completed on schedule as of August 1, 2023. A very special thank you to Diane Roche for leading and driving this initiative.

Phonebook: Has been delivered to the printer and is targeted to be available to residents in September.

New Resident Meeting: On Thursday, Aug. 17, a New Resident Orientation Meeting took place. Communications Committee, led by Mary von Ziegesar, and Executive Director Mark Rhatigan completed a business presentation. New residents were introduced to our staff and were invited to sign up, on-site, to OronoqueVillage. com.

Hammonds, industrial engineer/surveyor and now an OV resident, and I met with Town and BHCC to discuss flooding issues that included the drenching and cleaning up of the third hole. Barry is currently preparing a proposed plan that will be reviewed by the parties.

Motions made:

The Board voted unanimously to approve the proposed revisions to House Facilities Rules and Regulations in Article II, Section B. The proposed rules had been distributed to residents in the Aug. 1 issue of The Villager. The revisions include special consideration for post-funeral gatherings held for residents who pass away. They also modify current restrictions to allow more simultaneous use of Clubhouses for specific types of events.

The Board also voted unanimously to approve the distribution of recommended revisions to the OVCA Declaration to the unit owners for their vote.

These recommendations include clarifying provisions for Entity Unit Owners and the implementation of a Community Contribution Fee that would be assessed on units at the time of sale and the responsibility of the unit purchaser to pay.

A Unit Owner Meeting is planned Sept. 6, at 6 p.m. at NCB to present the recommendation to unit owners and give them an opportunity to ask questions.

An information packet will be distributed in advance of that session. Ballots will be mailed to all unit owners after that session.

A LETTER FROM THE HOUSE COMMITTEE

IMPORTANT MEETING FOR OV CLUBS/ORGANIZATIONS—— PLEASE READ

Dear Clubs and Organizations of Oronoque Village,

As you may be aware, with the addition of new clubs in our Village and the robust social calendar of many groups, finding dates on the calendar for events can be very challenging.

On Aug. 15, at the OVCA Board meeting, a new rule was approved to assist with this process.

The House Committee will facilitate a meeting for clubs and organizations that book events on the calendar. The purpose of this meeting will be to collaborate and find acceptable dates for events. One representative from each organization is requested to attend the meeting with proposed event dates (and alternates) for the 2024 calendar year.

Your group should plan out your proposed event dates BEFORE this meeting. Please note that organizations/clubs that have had a historically ongoing scheduled date/time for their events each month are given priority for those dates/times and do not need to attend (ex: Bingo, Book Club, Funseekers, Karaoke, etc). However, written activity request forms (no emails) MUST be filled out by everyone and handed into the Business Office in order for events to be formalized on the calendar.

The decisions made at the Oct. 11 meeting will be binding and used as a starting point for scheduling starting on Nov. 1 by the Business Office staff. If your group is not represented at the meeting, you will still be able to schedule dates on the calendar starting on Nov. 1, but dates scheduled at this meeting will have priority.

The rationale is to provide an opportunity for all OV groups to work collaboratively to schedule dates for 2024 without having everyone rushing to the office on Nov. 1 in competition with each other.





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ARTIST OF THE MONTH: DORIS COUSINS

Residents are encouraged to visit NCB this month to enjoy Doris Cousins' exhibition of impressionistic watercolors. Although she considers painting a hobby that she has enjoyed for about 35 years, her award-winning pieces have been featured (and sold) at galleries and art festivals.

Doris discovered her talents as a young mother, working on art projects with her children. "While painting with the kids, I found that I was able to really express myself," she says. "I love working in watercolor because it allows me freedom and flow as well as an abundance of color. My technique is to not stay in the lines, I am an 'out of the box' painter."

After realizing her capabilities, Doris attended workshops and took classes to enhance her skills."I studied with Ed Whitney, Frank Webb and Claude Croney," she says. "From there, I was able to start showing my paintings and worked with galleries and art fairs and festivals in Westchester and Fairfield Counties as well as the Hamptons. Along the way, I sold some paintings and won a few awards."

Spending much of her youth in the Westchester and Long Island, N.Y., areas, Doris developed a great love of the water and an appreciation for Mother Earth, which further ignited her passion for painting. STRATFORD COMMISSION ON AGING PRESENTS STUDY RESULTS

n June 22 at the North Clubhouse, members of the Town of Stratford Commission on Aging presented findings from a recent study. The Commission oversaw six focus groups in the Town of Stratford to determine the needs of the 55-plus age community. One of these groups met right here in the Village on April 6.

Carl Glad, chair of the Commission on Aging, and Tammy Trojanowski, director of community and senior services, shared feedback from the focus groups as well as insights gleaned from interviews with visiting nurses and staff members at two Stratford-based agencies: Baldwin Center and Sterling House.

Among its findings:

Almost 26 percent of Stratford residents are age 60 and older, which is above the Connecticut state average of 23 percent.

In Stratford, over 40 percent of these older homeowners spend more than 35 percent of their incomes on housing.

Stratford does well in meeting the needs of older residents, offering services such as in-home vaccinations, Meals on Wheels, and senior services at the Baldwin Center.

While the Town provides such resources, the study results offered insight into how best to expand assistance for Stratford's older residents. With this information, the Town of Stratford developed a strategic plan to enhance an age-friendly Stratford.

Among the plan highlights are:


To better communicate the availability of programs like the Connecticut Energy Assistance Program, Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and the Baldwin Center lunch programs.

To further support efforts to increase age-friendly transportation options, including the Baldwin Center bus service and Dial-A-Ride.

To advocate for services that allow older adults to age at home.

For those wishing to explore a variety of available services for older adults, including tax and energy assistance, support groups for those dealing with Alzheimer's and free blood pressure screenings, the Baldwin Center offers resources to assist.

SEPTEMBER IS DYSTONIA AWARENESS MONTH

Big Bird and Oscar the Grouch suffered from dystonia. Connecticut resident Carroll Spinney, who played Big Bird and Oscar the Grouch on Sesame Street from its inception in 1969 through 2018 and who passed away in 2019, had dystonia for many years. Spinney's symptoms worsened as he got older and eventually forced him to retire. He said that they included involuntary muscle contractions, slow repetitive movements and cramps, light sensitivity in his eyes, twisting movements and vocal box spasms.


Dystonia affects approximately 300,000 people in the USA, with one-third of them being children, yet most people either know very little about dystonia or have never heard of it. Mayor Hoydick Proclaimed September "Dystonia Awareness Month" in Stratford; towns, cities, counties and states across the U.S. issue similar proclamations each year.

Dystonia is the third most common movement disorder, after Essential Tremor and Parkinson's Disease. Movement disorders are neurologic conditions that cause problems with movement

The National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke (NINDS), the division of the National Institutes of Health (NIH) that researches movement disorders, describes dystonia as "a movement disorder that involves unintended (involuntary) muscle contractions that can cause twisting and repetitive movements or abnormal postures. The movements are sometimes painful...dystonia can occur at any age."

When a person raises an arm, chews food, closes an eyelid or makes any movement, the brain sends a signal to the nerve controlling a muscle to make the muscle contract. At the same time, the brain sends a signal to the nerve controlling the opposing muscle to make it relax. All motion, from the smallest to the largest, works that way. There's too much electricity in the brains of people with dystonia and conflicting signals are sent to the two opposing muscles, causing both to contract. The result is contortion, spasms and often pain.

Focal dystonias affect one part of the body. The heads of people with cervical dystonia, are painfully pulled forward, backward or sidewards to the shoulder. Blepharospasm, causes the eyes to continuously blink rapidly. A former co-worker of my wife had to tape his eyelids open. The vocal cords of people with Spasmodic Dysphonia are either pushed too close together, causing the voice to be rough and gravelly, or are pulled too far apart causing the



voice to be faint and breathy.

Longtime NPR radio host Diane Rehm had to leave the air when she developed spasmodic dysphonia. Piano virtuoso Leon Fleisher lost the ability to play with his right hand after his fingers curled uncontrollably.

Segmental dystonias affect two or more connected body areas (for example the neck, shoulder and arm). New York Yankees star Chuck Knoblauch lost the ability to throw the ball accurately and also had difficulty hitting.

If two or more areas in different parts of the body are affected, the dystonia is termed multifocal (for example the eyes and vocal cords).

Generalized dystonia refers to dystonia that is not limited to a single part of the body but affects multiple muscle groups throughout the body. As with other disorders, symptoms can progress as a person ages. In the last years of her life, our daughter, Joanna, transported in a wheelchair, communicated with a letter board, received medications and nutrition through a feeding tube and breathed through a tracheostomy tube. She had difficulty using her hands because her fingers were twisted and curled. Her head was pulled sideways to her neck. Joanna's vocal cords were pulled too far apart and she had difficulty controlling her mouth.

The cause of dystonia can be primary, which is caused by genetics. Secondary dystonias are caused by outside factors such as stroke, head injury, toxins, other illnesses such as cerebral palsy or reaction to certain medications. Michael J. Fox developed dystonia in his feet from the levodopa that he takes to treat the Parkinson's.

Most doctors, including many neurologists, have little experience diagnosing or treating people with dystonia. Movement disorder doctors, an area of specialization within neurology, have the expertise and experience.

Dystonia is treated with oral medications, botulinum toxin injections and, as a last resort, deep brain stimulation surgery. One of the first uses for Botox, the most frequently used botulinum toxin, was for the dystonia which causes rapid eye blinking - Blepharospasm.


