#### REMINDER TO CLUBS & ORGANIZATIONS: RSVPS FOR RESIDENTS TAKE PRIORITY

When planning social events that require preregistration or prepayment, OV clubs, committees and groups are reminded that RSVP dates for residents must be established before allowing nonresidents to attend an OV function (with the exception of a companion/guest for a single OV resident).

The following rule was approved by the OVCA Board of Directors and is published in the Handbook of Rules & Regulations: Organizations using the Club Houses for events which require reservations must establish a cut-off date for resident priority. The one exception to this is a single resident who wishes to include one guest (non-resident). After the cut-off date, non-resident guests may be included in a resident reservation if space is available.

#### A LETTER FROM THE HOUSE COMMITTEE

#### IMPORTANT MEETING FOR OV CLUBS/ORGANIZATIONS—— PLEASE READ

Dear Clubs and Organizations of Oronoque Village,

As you may be aware, with the addition of new clubs in our Village and the robust social calendar of many groups, finding dates on the calendar for events can be very challenging.

On Aug. 15, at the OVCA Board meeting, a new rule was approved to assist with this process.

The House Committee will facilitate a meeting for clubs and organizations that book events on the calendar. The purpose of this meeting will be to collaborate and find acceptable dates for events. One representative from each organization is requested to attend the meeting with proposed event dates (and alternates) for the 2024 calendar year.

Your group should plan out your proposed event dates BEFORE this meeting. Please note that organizations/clubs that have had a historically ongoing scheduled date/time for their events each month are given priority for those dates/times and do not need to attend (ex: Bingo, Book Club, Funseekers, Karaoke, etc). However, written activity request forms (no emails) MUST be filled out by everyone and handed into the Business Office in order for events to be formalized on the calendar.

The decisions made at the Oct. 11 meeting will be binding and used as a starting point for scheduling starting on Nov. 1 by the Business Office staff. If your group is not represented at the meeting, you will still be able to sched-

ule dates on the calendar starting on Nov. 1, but dates scheduled at this meeting will have priority.

The rationale is to provide an opportunity for all OV groups to work collaboratively to schedule dates for 2024 without having everyone rushing to the office on Nov. 1 in competition with each other.

IF APPLICABLE, PLEASE BE CERTAIN THAT YOUR OR-GANIZATION IS REPRESENTED AT THIS MEETING. This meeting will take some time to accomplish the task, so please be patient.



#### **PAVING PROJECT UPDATE: 2023 PROGRAM**

As many residents are aware, we will be continuing our paving project in the fall of 2023. We have met with our contractor, Burns Construction, and we have been assured that this year the schedule will be adhered to and the work will be completed on time.

The work will begin during the last week of September with infrastructure repairs to Dakota Lane, which has experienced severe flooding problems. We will also be paving several driveways and walkways, including the walkway at the NCB pool.

Road paving will commence on the week of Oct. 16. We will be paving the following roads, including driveways and curbs: Dakota Lane, Montauk Lane, Ottawa Lane, Sequoia Lane, Creek Lane, 103 cul-de-sac, 86 culde sac. The work is expected to be continuous, and should be finished by early November.

Residents of the affected roads will be notified when their road is expected to be paved.

We do our best to avoid inconvenience, but newly paved roads have to set for 24 hours before residents can drive on them. Those impacted can park their cars in the SCB parking lot if they consider it necessary.

#### A SONG FOR AN UNSUNG HERO

Oronoque Villagers enjoy many advantages; however, the Southside residents have a special one: the services of a dedicated public servant, United States Postal Service (USPS) Mail Carrier Danny Dufresne. Danny, as he is known to all, is celebrating 50 years of making life easier and sometimes safer for the rest of us.

Danny grew up in Stratford and, upon graduation from high school, joined the Navy. After hours of testing and vetting, he was assigned to the submarine division and, for the next four years, spent many months and many miles below the surface of the ocean.

Upon his discharge, he attended Southern Connecticut College and then joined the USPS where he worked himself up from a part-timer to a permanent, full-time mail carrier.

In 1993, he was offered the Oronoque Village southside route and was advised by the carrier he would replace to take the assignment, telling him, "Once you figure out the address system here, you will enjoy the work."

Danny took him up on it and has never looked back. He has had some memorable times in Oronoque. Once, when delivering her late husband's ashes to an Oronoque widow, she asked him to please come in and open the package for her. Danny explained that he was not allowed to do more than deliver the mail and made a quick exit.

On another occasion, the morning after a fierce snowstorm, Danny drove his truck slowly through an Oronoque lane, noticing a huge snowdrift in front of one of the garage doors. Just then, the garage door opened, the owner waved, lost his footing, fell into the snowbank and was buried. Danny jumped out of his truck, dug the fellow out and made a friend for life.



Having spent 30 of his 50 years of government service here at Oronoque, he has made many friends and earned admiration for his outstanding service. He has a smile for everyone, goes the extra mile to deliver packages to our doors, rings our bells to tell us they are here and helps us straighten out any misdirected mail. No one could do it better.

The USPS will honor Danny for his 50 years of service this month during an employees-only ceremony. We can honor him by letting him know how much we truly appreciate his thoughtful and friendly service over these many years.

#### LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OFFERS VOTER REGISTRATION GUIDELINES

By Marge Heffel

No one can vote until they become registered. To be registered, you must be a U.S. citizen and age18 or older on Election Day (Nov. 7 this year).

Wait! Why is this important to Oronoque? Most of us have been voting for half a century!

We all have a new neighbor, right? Are you that new neighbor? Did you remember that you must register or re-register when you move to a new town within Connecticut.

You should also fill out a new voter registration form if you change your name, change your party affiliation, or move within your town, because a change of address may affect your voting location.

You can obtain a voter registration form at Town Hall, the public library, the DMV and other state agency offices. To obtain a voter registration form by mail, call the Stratford Registrar of Voters at 203-385-4048 or the Town Clerk at 203-385-4020 and request a form be sent to you. Once you complete the form, it can be mailed (or delivered) to the registrar of voters or the town clerk, both of whom are located at Stratford Town Hall, 2725 Main St.

If you use the printed form, you can mail it or hand it in to the Stratford registrar of voters. Alternatively, if you have a driver's license, you can register online via the state of Connecticut's website https://voterregistration.ct.gov/OLVR/welcome.do or via the voter education page at the League of Women Voters of CT website https://my.lwv.org/connecticut

#### What are the deadlines?

For any primary, your mailed-in application must be postmarked or received by the registrar of voters or by a voter registration agency or electronically submitted by the fifth day before the primary, or you may apply in-per-

son to your registrar until noon on the last business day before the primary (Nov. 6 in 2023).

For a general election, if you register in-person, mail in your registration form or e-file your application, it must be postmarked or received by your town's registrar by the seventh

day before an election (in 2023, that's Oct. 31). If you miss the deadline, you can register and vote in-person at your polling place between 6 a.m. and 8 p.m. on Election Day.

#### **MAINTENANCE MATTERS**

#### REMINDER OF HOLIDAY DECORATION RULES

1. Small outdoor displays are permitted if placed in the foundation planting area, on doors, the walls next to doors, including garage doors, or on decks.

2. No decorations that pose a safety hazard, are excessive or are reported as a nuisance are allowed.

3. Displays may not be put up in the common areas, including mailbox stations.

4. Christmas, Hanukkah and Kwanza decorations may be put up the day after Thanksqiving and must be removed by Jan. 21.

5. No plastic or inflatable decorations, no lights other than small seasonal lights on decks only, no decorations on light posts and no live lit trees on decks are permitted.

6. Other holiday decorations, with the same restrictions listed previously, may be put up two weeks prior to the holiday and are to be removed two weeks after the holiday.

7. No displays may use extension cords that cross walkways.

8. Hazardous or excessive displays will be removed by the Maintenance Department.

9. The American and State of Connecticut flags may be displayed with a six foot or smaller flag pole attached to the building. Seasonal banners may be displayed with a similar sized flag pole

or on a stand in the foundation planting area. Flags/banners may not be draped or displayed on the unit in any manner.

#### OV WINE CLUB ENJOYED SAMPLINGS FROM THE VINEYARDS OF FRANCE

On the evening of Aug. 24, 40 OV residents took part in another Wine Club experience. We transported ourselves to the fabled Loire Valley of France.

From the times of the medieval monarchs, the valley's vineyards have yielded wines yearning to be sampled by us. And we did, enjoying seven different varieties in one night. Our guide to this region was our trusted steward, Michelle DeWyngaert, with the famous French last name (translated) "Of The Vine Yard."

Our guests were greeted at the door with a refreshing rosé, called "Thibaut Boudigon," from the area near the historic city of Tours. Each guest was given an assortment of nuts to accompany this entrance wine. When the "main event" began, everyone found their tables laden with fruit, bite-sized wrapped sandwiches and cheese assortments.

During the course of the evening, we traversed the breadth of the Loire Valley's array of wines. We commenced with wines of the vineyards from Nantes, near the Atlantic, to the more western French region of Centre. Our route was similar to James Bond's pursuit of the arch villain, Goldfinger, in the 1959 novel of the same name. No doubt, to ease the tensions from long days of hard driving, Mr. Bond relaxed with a bottle from one of the whites we sampled: "Domain De La Pepiere" "Domaine Adele Roi" and "Domaine Arnaud Lambert." Each one is cool, refreshing, crisp and moderate. They'd go with anything at any time, and anywhere.



Reds followed the whites. We had three of them: "Domaine Bernard Baudry," "Domaine Filliatreau" and "Domaine Henri Bourgeois." The first two were derived from the cabernet franc grape, the last from the pinot noir grape. All were smooth, not harsh, like a martini, shaken not stirred.

As always, we ended the evening with Dorothy Tanski's homemade cookies and eclairs. Our Wine Club events do not end suddenly, but are elongated with the mingling of friends, conversations and sipping more wine. And that's the way it's been all these years and, hopefully, for many more to come.






