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

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ELISABETH BRESLAV'S MEMOIR DETAILS LIFE UNDER NAZI OCCUPATION

“Five Years Under Nazi Occupation -- A World War II Memoir of Resilience and Survival in the Netherlands” by OV resident Elisabeth Hofboer Breslav was recently released by Nedvision Publishing.

While there are numerous personal accounts of the horrendous military battles and the abomination of the Holocaust, there is a dearth of English-language writings about the Nazi occupation of Europe from the perspective of ordinary citizens who suffered through it.

Among the fast-dwindling group of teens who survived the 1940-1945 Nazi occupation of Holland, Elisabeth was 12 years old when Hitler's troops marched into the Netherlands and 17 when the country was finally liberated. She describes how, for five endless-seeming years, she spent many nights hiding under the stairs during bombardments, as her father prayed and artillery shells rained on the flat roof of her house.

With her school taken over to shelter soldiers, she tells how her class met in the unheated concrete basement of a mental institution where German scientists performed the most unspeakable experiments on the residents. And, always hungry and cold, how she spent her free time hustling to gather firewood and food while often having to dodge drunken German soldiers looking for some entertainment.

Elisabeth shares how she suffered the loss of her best girlfriend and many other Jewish classmates, who were deported and died in Hitler's infamous camps. When the Nazis began rounding up men for work in Germany, her family hid her older brother in a damp cellar under the kitchen floor. When, at last, the Canadian tanks rolled into Amsterdam on May 8, 1945, she sat fearfully at her mother's bedside in the hospital, watching her ever-so-slowly recover from emergency surgery that had been performed by candlelight during one of the last bombings.

For 95-year-old Elisabeth, the publication of this memoir is a dream come true. In the early 1990s, she started writing a series of short stories about her experience as a teen during

World War II Holland. When one of these was selected for publication in an anthology, titled “That Mad Game -- Growing up in a Warzone -- an Anthology of Essays from Around the World” (Cinco Punto Press) in 2012, she decided to edit and compile them into a book. “It has been a long wait, but very much worth it,” she says. Her other writings include essays in the Hearst newspapers and The Villager.

In her book, Elisabeth depicts the day-to-day struggle for survival and the determination to live. This is a tale of one solitary teenager who speaks for millions of her contemporaries.

The book is distributed by Ingram and is available at Barnes & Noble, Amazon and many independent bookstores. All net proceeds of the sale of the book will be donated to the International Red Cross.



About Elisabeth Breslav
Born in Amsterdam, Elisabeth left Holland in 1947 to start a career as a translator/interpreter by working as an au pair, first in London and then in Paris. When her command of English and French reached the near native level, she struck out on her own and worked for several American companies in Paris.

In 1956 she met Walter Breslav, an American GI, came to the U.S. and was married the following year. Now widowed, she has lived at Oronoque Village since 2003. She began submitting articles and essays to The Villager in 2004. In 2005 she started a regular column, “The Village Round Table”, later followed by many years of “You Meet Such Interesting People.”

She also organized several arts and crafts shows and was a member and past coordinator of the OV Book Club. She is among the founders of the OV Writer's Group and still a member. In addition to her writing, she continues to be active in the OV community. Despite profound hearing loss, she organized the Pletman Concerts series from 2010 to 2022.

In 2024, the same publisher will release the Dutch version of her memoir.

OV WINE CLUB'S HOLIDAY TASTING

The OV Wine Club held its annual holiday tasting event on the evening of Nov. 30 at NCB. This event was a true holiday experience, because there were wrappings and unwrappings awaiting us. I will soon explain.

Leading our excursion was, again, our wine specialist Michelle DeWyngaert. If nothing else, I like writing these articles because I can re-tell that Michelle has this great last name when translated to French: "of the vineyard." How cool is that?

A guest to the Wine Club is always treated with a smile and a welcome, this time accompanied by a glass of sparkling rose pinot noir from the Burgundy region of France, called "Victorine De Chastenay." Complementing the wine were shrimp dabbled in a cocktail sauce. As the wine tasting began, guests found their tables laden with many other appetizers for the balance of the evening.

The theme of our tasting was a "wine terroir" experience. Terroir is a French word noting a "sense of place." It explains the differences between wines of the same grape. These differences are impacted by fundamentals such as: climate, soil, topography and terrain. A chardonnay from the Willamette Valley in Oregon will not taste the same as one from the St. Veran region of France. Likewise, a pinot noir from Santa Barbara, Calif., will differ from one from Burgundy in France.

While we knew the grapes of the wines being tasted (chardonnay and pinot noir), we didn't know their origins. The bottles were wrapped during the tasting. We'd sip and then discuss the differences. And, like any tasting of anything, each person may have a different bent on what's really good, and not so good. It makes life and wine-tasting appealing and fun.



The unwrapping came at the conclusion of each wine group tasting. Michelle commented on the uniqueness of each wine's area, which explains the differences of taste and smell. For example, a "St. Innocent" chardonnay from Oregon has a coastal climate and volcanic soil. Those ingredients create a totally different chardonnay versus one from France. Likewise, with a pinot noir (or any grape). It's all about: location, location, location. Wine is truly a passport to the world.

With all our OV wine-tasting events, the evening doesn't end with the final tasting. As is our tradition, Dorothy Tanski's cookies are brought out as we nibble, sip and converse in a true community spirit, ... even more prevalent during the holiday season.

Until our next wine-tasting event in the spring, remember that the perfect blend of wine is drinking it with good friends.

MAINTENANCE MATTERS

WARNING:

FROZEN PIPES CAN CAUSE COLLATERAL DAMAGE

As the temperatures drop, we see an increase in the number of damages caused by frozen pipes.

When frozen pipes burst, water spreads from the burst pipe and saturates everything in its path, causing damages to walls, ceilings, floors and irreplaceable personal items such as photographs, journals, yearbooks and other paper-based mementos.

Ultimately, these damages will be the cause of a higher cost for insurance premiums.

With proper precautions, frozen pipes—and the resulting damages—are avoidable.

Please take the following measures to keep your pipes from freezing:

- ✓ Make sure your lower level thermostat is set at a minimum of 65 degrees.
- ✓ Make sure all outside faucets are turned off and your hoses have been stored.
- ✓ Please be reminded that, in preparation for the winter weather, you should turn off the water feeding your out-

door spigot. This process will help prevent freezing and pipe bursts. It is a good idea to first turn off the water from inside your unit and then open your outside spigot to allow excess water to escape from your water line.

✓ Trickle water through your faucets that are against outside walls. Let cold water drip overnight.

✓ Keep your thermostat set at the same temperature during both day and night. You might be in the habit of turning down the heat when you're asleep, but further drops in the temperature may freeze your pipes.


✓ Open cabinet doors to allow heat to get to un-insulated pipes under sinks

and appliances near exterior walls.

✓ Remove ceiling tiles in the lower level to allow warm air to ventilate pipes.

ATTENTION SNOWBIRDS: It is essential that you share this information with the people responsible for watching your units while you are away. New England winters can bring bitterly cold weather with temperatures that drop significantly during the night.

HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS FROM THE STRATFORD FIRE MARSHAL

▪ Don't put your live Christmas tree up too early or leave it up for longer than 2 weeks.

▪ Place trees away from heat sources, including fireplaces and heat vents. The heat will dry out the tree, causing it to be more easily ignited by heat, flame or sparks.

▪ Keep the live tree stand filled with water at all times.

▪ Use only nonflammable decorations.

▪ Don't link more than three light strands, unless the di-

rections indicate its safe. Connect strings of lights to an extension cord before plugging the cord into an outlet.

▪ Avoid using lit candles; consider using battery-operated flameless candles, which can look, smell and feel like real candles.

▪ Ensure that Christmas trees and other holiday decorations don't block an exit way.
