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

OVTD PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE – JANUARY 23, 2024

Good evening, all! I hope everyone had a smooth and happy transition into 2024!

First off, I would like to thank, on behalf of all of us In the Village, our fantastic Maintenance staff. This winter, so far, has been a

weird mix of rain, snow, and ice. The Maintenance crews have always been on top of it, supplying us with salted paths, stairs, roads and driveways. All with our safety in mind. Thank you.

Another shout-out to our Maintenance crews: During the last phase of the road project, there were issues with the drainage on Dakota Lane. By using our labor with the assistance of Burns Construction, we saved approximately \$40,000 in labor/repair costs by repairing -- instead of replacing -- the drainage system.

The OV Strategic Planning Teams have been working diligently behind the scenes. On Feb. 6 at NCB there was a presentation of each team's recommendations to the Strategic Management Team – made up of both OVTD and OVCA Officers. This plan will be a guide designed to carry us into the future with plans that benefit all of us. Back by popular demand: the OVTD Roundtable! This year the roundtable event will be held on March 7 at 6:30 p.m. at NCB. We invite all residents to attend. All of our committees will have a designated table/tables that can be joined by residents for updates and one-on-one questions to specific committee members. Every 25-30 minutes, residents will switch to another table of their choice. This is a chance to have your voice heard.Refreshments will be served. Jonathan Towle, chair of the Roads Committee, will give you more detailed information. However, I'm happy to announce that we have been diligently working on a short- and long-term plan for our roads that will cover the next 20 years. Our immediate goal in this is to complete what the current project did not: the last 10 roads in the Village.

A preliminary 20-year plan should be completed by the March 7 roundtable event. More about this later, but we will be forming an Alternative Funding Committee. This will basically be a Grant Committee encompassing the work which Bill Alletzhauser and Debbie Gunzelman have begun. Oronoque Village is now registered with the Federal Government which, in turn, will link us to appropriate grants available. Should anyone be interested in this committee, please do not hesitate to contact me.

A team from Stratford Emergency Medical Services gave a lecture and hands-on training on CPR and the use of the Automated External Defibulator (AED) units that are located in both the North and South Clubhouses at Oronoque Village and also can be found in many other lo-



cations, all of them marked by the AED sign.

Important tips that were shared were, if at home and you need to administer CPR, follow these steps: (1) call 911 and stay on the line; (2) unlock your door so the EMS team can get in; (3) remove the victim's shirt; and (4) administer hands-on CPR until the EMS team arrives.

MAINTENANCE MATTERS

TIPS FOR AVOIDING — AND ADDRESSING — SEWER BACKUPS

There are several causes for wastewater to back up in your home's plumbing system. This includes tree root systems that have invaded sewer lines, blocked drains, rips or tears in pipes or extreme weather events such as torrential rain.

Sewage backups can also be caused by something as simple as someone flushing the wrong thing down the toilet. (Just because a certain item can make it through the toilet and into the sewer main doesn't mean it's capable of breaking down once inside the sewer lateral.) Items such as baby or adult wipes, cotton balls, or feminine products can lead to sewage to spill out onto the floor.

Gurgling Noises: Some sewage backups won't produce foul odors and will instead cause strange gurgling noises to come from your plumbing.

When wastewater is backing up into the home, there may be air pockets in the sewer lines that will cause strange and unusual noises to come from the drain.

Slow Drains: Another sign of sewage backup is slow drains. As the sewage level rises in the pipes, it will begin to slow down your water flow and can even cause some drains to become completely clogged and unusable.

Before long, you could find that you're unable to flush

backups if flushed down the toilet. Please, avoid flushing anything other than human waste and toilet paper down your toilet.

How do you know if you're suffering from a sewage backup? Here are some signs to look out for.

Smells and Odors: The first and most common sign that there is a sewage backup somewhere in your house or business is the smell. As wastewater backs up into

the home, you will likely notice an overpowering foul odor emanating from your toilets, sinks, tubs and other drains.

Sinks and Toilets Overflowing: Another common sign of a sewage backup is when your sinks and toilets start to overflow. If the sewage has risen high enough, it will seep out of your drains and into your home.

Before long, you could find yourself dealing with wastewater spilling over from the sink or tub and across the floor of the bathroom. In some cases, this may even result in sewage backing up through your toilet and allowing for raw

your toilet or drain water from bathtubs and sinks at all. If this happens, don't try to clear the clog yourself with chemicals as this may make the problem worse.

Puddles and Pooling Water: As a sewage backup becomes more severe, it may begin pooling water in your yard or other parts of your prop-

erty. If the wastewater is pooling near the foundation of your home, it could seep into crawlspaces and basements.

Ultimately, the wastewater may soak into the ground and require extensive restoration efforts to clean up. You should not attempt to mop or otherwise clean up this type of standing water on your own.

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


