

OV Tax District Announcement

LONG-TERM ROAD REPAVING PLAN

On March 6, as vice president of OV Tax District. I presented a long-term road repaving plan to Executive Director Mark Rhatigan and Accountant Diane Roche. The following evening, the same plan was presented to Oronoque Village residents during the OVTD Round Table Meeting.

Because of the difficulty determining the future cost of repaving, as well as the adjustments that would be required for inflation, a model was proposed allowing for a variety of input changes at any time during the repaving process. The major points of this plan consist of the following:

- The plan would not begin for approximately 5 years or until the current road loan of \$1.25 million is repaid and the last unpaved roads are completed.
- It includes all roads, driveways and curbing.
- It starts with the oldest roads first, but allows
- for flexibility in scheduling depending on the condition

of the roads at that time.

- The plan allows for changes to the yearly revenue requirements, the cost of repaving each square yard of surface area, and a factor for inflation over the next 20-plus years of repaving.
- The plan is set up in an Excel spreadsheet and quickly calculates the cost of the project and revenue requirements, depending on the data input at any time during the repaying cycle.

During the round-table discussions, a variety of cost data points and revenue requirements suggested by OV residents were input into the Excel spreadsheet. Depending on the input, a break-even point for the 20-plus year program was calculated.

On April 23, at the conclusion of the OV Tax District Board meeting, we will present the plan to anyone who was unable to attend the round-table discussions and would like to see how this long-term road repaying plan works.

MAY 4 IS SPRING CLEANUP DAY

Villagers will have multiple opportunities to get rid of unwanted goods on Saturday, May 4. From 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., dumpsters will be placed in the rear parking lot of SCB for the disposal of household items, including furniture, appliances and metal objects that are less than 8 feet in size. Members of the Maintenance staff will be on hand to assist residents.

A shredding truck will be parked at NCB from 9 a.m. to noon. Villagers are encouraged to use this service to de-

stroy outdated confidential documents, such as bank statements, credit card receipts, invoices, insurance forms and cancelled checks.

The following items are <u>not</u> allowed for disposal in the dumpsters provided on Cleanup Day.

These items must be taken directly to the Town of Stratford Transfer Station:

Household trash

Items that would normally fit into the trash container for weekly pickup, including cardboard.

Leaves, branches, stumps

Hazardous materials, paint

Recyclable materials

Demolition material (i.e. asphalt, shingles, sheet-rock, concrete, tile, brick or any other masonry debris)

Freon-containing appliances (i.e. refrigerators)

Electronics of any kind

Tires, vehicles, oil tanks

CALLIGRAPHY CLASSES SCHEDULED FOR MAY

The flexible tip technique relies on controlling the pressure on the pen and learning what it can and cannot do. A good handwriting is definitely not a requirement for this class!

A Trumbull resident, Irene has been intrigued by fancy letters since childhood and is a lifelong doodler.

She has taken many classes in calligraphy and is a member of the Washington, D.C., Calligraphers Guild, the International and Association of Master Penmen, Engrossers and Teachers of Handwriting, (IAMPETH).

SO, YOU THINK YOU KNOW ELECTIONS?

The League of Women Voters' (LWV) Oronoque Village Study Group hosted Stratford Town Registrar James Simon for a question-and-answer session about elections and voting in Stratford. He brought a quiz that we all took. Here is one of the questions:

True or False: Under some conditions, you can ask to vote in your car and have poll workers bring a ballot to you.

Answer: State law allows curbside voting in cases of "temporary incapacity," such as getting sick on the way to the polls. There was one such Stratford case reported in November 2023: a voter had someone drive them to the polls; the driver got out and asked poll workers to carry a ballot out to

the curb. The person voted, the ballot was placed in a privacy envelope, and a poll worker representing each party loaded it into the tabulator.

Obviously, we do not want a line of cars asking for such service and slowing the voting process. An Absentee Ballot might be preferable if you fear you will be incapacitated on Election Day.

More than 40 Villagers attended Andy Poniros' March 24 lecture on safe viewing of the April 8 solar eclipse.

Andy is an OV resident and NASA/JPL public outreach volunteer. He gave an interesting lecture and passed out NASA eclipse glasses. While OV is not in the path of totality, weather permitting, NASA's Eclipse Website reported that, from Stratford, an observer should have expected to see about 90.7 percent maximum coverage of the sun by the moon at 3:26 p.m.

The eclipse was expected to start at around 2:12 p.m. and end at 4:37 p.m. on April 8.

Attendees were reminded that, without proper glasses, viewers should not look directly at the sun during an eclipse. Indirect viewing by using a colander, card stock with a hole punched in it or shadow box – which allow viewing the shadow – are safe choices.

If you missed Andy's lecture, there are several websites that demonstrate safe viewing techniques. Guys & Dolls looks forward to sponsoring Andy's next lecture on the James Webb telescope. Watch for an announcement in The Villager.


The book for May 1 is is "The Doctors Blackwell" by Janice P Nimura, a finalist for the 2022 Pulitzer Prize in Biography.
